

1 Citations to Sources

Here is a normal citation to an incollection work (Haggis 7). We will follow that up with a second citation to the same work (8). Then we reference a book (Public, *Elaborate* 194). Finally, we reference an online work (Grammar Girl).

Here is a citation for a thesis (Webb, “The Masters Thesis Template” 22). We will cite it a second time (23). Next is a citation for a film (Jhabvala). We will follow that up with a reference for a reference entry (“Noon”). After that is a citation for an entire issue of a journal (Appiah and Gates). Keeping up the theme of unusual entry types, we add a reference for an unpublished work (Salviati). Next we cite a review (Slater 224). Finally we reference an anonymous review (Review of *Anthology of Danish Literature* 785).

Here is a citation for one work by an author with multiple works (Askme, “Elaborate” 12). We follow it up with a citation for a different work by the same author (“Unique” 34). Next, we show another call back to the first work (“Elaborate” 45), and we end it with a third reference to the first work (56). Here is a citation for a work with many authors (Babich et al. 34). And here is a second citation to the same work (32).

Here’s a citation for a native MLA-style, nonsemantic entry fashioned from containers (J. Smith, “Heartbreak House”). This “containerized” type is not generally recommended for widespread use, but it is included here to allow for maximum compatibility with the 9th edition of the *MLA Handbook*. Here’s a citation for a patent with the option enabled to show all authors in a citation and entry (Sorace, Reinhardt, and Vaughn 12). Here’s a citation for another patent without this option set (Laufenberg et al. 102). Here’s a citation to a personal interview (J. Smith, Personal interview), and here’s one to an online lecture (Elk).

Here’s a book-length work by Tolstoy, showing a citation using non-Latin characters (Tolstoy, *Крейцерова* [Kreĭtserova] 22). Here’s an entry with a general editor (Crane, *The Red Badge of Courage*); notice, too, that the publisher name is automatically truncated. Here’s an essay-length work by Tolstoy with the title styled differently (Tolstoy, “К читателям [K chitateliām]” 22).

This is another typical citation (Morrison 12). This is an immediately subsequent citation to the same source (34), followed by an example of immediately subsequent citations lacking page reference (Morrison). This one shows a citation to a text by a prolific author (Frye, *Sound and Poetry* 12). Subsequent immediate citations to the same source look like this (34). Citations to a different source, same author, look like this (*Double Vision* 56). A citation to a source by a different author will reset some of these trackers (Morrison 101). Another citation to a different author again resets the author tracker (Frye, *Double Vision* 78). Suppressing the author’s name for someone like Morrison with only one source in the bibliography will print only the page numbers (102). Suppressing the name of a prolific author like Frye will print enough information to avoid ambiguity (*Sound and Poetry* 91). Suppressing Morrison’s name without a page number prints the title of the work (*Sula*). Different author citation to reset trackers (Frye, *Double Vision* 91). Typical citation (Morrison 12). Citation using `\mancite` to ignore the previous citation (Morrison 34).

2 Metadata from Sources

In addition to the above citations, it is also possible to use commands within a sentence to reference specific metadata for sources without having to look up this metadata directly. Using correct styling, these commands will print the full or shortened names of a work's author(s), the full or shortened title, and the year of publication, respectively: `\citeauthor{}`, `\citeauthor*{}`, `\citetitle{}`, `\citetitle*{}`, and `\citeyear{}`. The starred and unstarred variants of these commands might eventually swap places, so please keep this instability in mind with future updates.

This is the unstarred use of the first command to reference the full names of Kwame Anthony Appiah and Henry Louis Gates, Jr. It is followed by the starred use to cite just the last names of Appiah and Gates.

Here's an unstarred command to cite the title of a source with a defined `shorttitle` field: *WPA Guide*. Here's the starred version, which prints the long version of the title: *WPA Guide*. Here's the same effect using a work with no short title: *Libro de horas de Isabel I*. And here's the starred variant of the same source, showing no change: *Libro de horas de Isabel I*. The command also works for a title which ought to be printed in quotation marks: "Atmospheric Gamma-Ray and Neutron Flashes." Even though the command appears before the final period, this punctuation is pulled inside the quotation marks when using American localization.

Finally, here's an example showing the year alongside the title and author, using code to explain that our version of "Mimic and Moralist" by Kingsley Amis was published in 1984.

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
